Changes to the HSC

A few weeks ago the NSW minister for Education made an announcement regarding

changes to the HSC.



From 2020, students will be required to reach a minimum literacy and numeracy standard to be eligible for the HSC in addition to the existing requirements. Students can meet the standard by achieving a Band 8 in Year 9 NAPLAN (National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy) in each of their Reading, Writing and Numeracy tests from 2017. From 2018, an online Literacy and Numeracy test will be available for students to demonstrate they have met the standard."

In essence this means that 2016 Year 8 students who wish to be awarded the HSC will need to reach a Band 8 result in NAPLAN 2017 in Reading, Writing and Numeracy. If they do not, they will have further opportunities via an online test to meet the new benchmark.

Lithgow High School has developed a strategy to provide students with the opportunity to achieve this result. From this week, teachers in English and Maths will be working to ensure students are well prepared to do well in the NAPLAN tests in 2017.

The fundamental areas that will be addressed are:

Classroom and homework strategies that explicitly teach NAPLAN skills in deconstructing and responding to questions.

Explicit NAPLAN assessment tasks

In TERM 1 2017 enhanced exam preparations, including a full NAPLAN run-through 3 weeks prior to NAPLAN

Please encourage your child to engage in the preparatory tasks to ensure that students in Year 9 reach the literacy and numeracy benchmark of Year 8.

NEW RECREATIONAL FISHING PROJECT



OFFICIAL MEDIA RELEASE: Member for Bathurst Paul Toole announced this week our school will receive a significant investment in new recreational fishing projects for the local region.

"Recreational fishing is an integral part of our local lifestyle with a large percentage of our residents participating in fishing each year, making it one of our most popular outdoor recreational activities. It is vitally important we invest in infrastructure and programs to support and enhance such a popular and healthy activity as recreational fishing. "Mr Toole said.

Mr Toole said the new project to be funded in the region in 2016-17 will help improve the recreational fishing experience for local fishers.

'The Lithgow High School (LHS) aquaculture and fishing sustainability project will receive a grant of \$10,000 and the project will see fingerlings nurtured at LHS aquaculture facility, then transferred to a temporary holding dam where growth rates are measured and fish tagged before being released locally to be caught and monitored."

"It is great to see \$2.2 million will be invested in 42 new recreational fishing projects across NSW this financial year. This on top of \$13.6 million worth of existing projects funded through the Recreational Fishing Trust.

"The project will help improve the recreational fishing experience for enthusiasts by stocking more fish, building fishing platforms and cleaning tables, providing recreational fishing education and protecting fish habitats."

'The NSW Government is proud of its recreational fishing sector, and fishers can be assured that when they purchase a fishing licence, their money is going straight back into the Trust to develop projects that will enhance their fishing experience."

The recreational fishing sector in NSW generates around \$3.4 billion to the State's economy and accounts for more than 14,000 jobs across NSW.

Students are reminded to access their online Literacy Planet and Mathletics accounts to assist with extra study and revision of previous learning throughout the year.

Year 12

The HSC course has begun for our 2017 HSC candidates. All students have been given a copy of the Assessment Schedules for their HSC courses and important information regarding their pattern of study and BOSTES requirements. This Assessment booklet outlines the mandatory minimum requirements, the

process for handing in assessment tasks, information regarding special provisions and how to apply. It is well worth a regular read through and is a guide to refer to during the course for students. Key people within the school to assist with any enquiry is the Year Advisor Mrs Alexander, the Careers Advisor Mrs Hamment and the Year 12 Deputy.

Peer Mediation

There are times when students can come into conflict with other peers. It is important for students to develop the ability to work through issues that they may have with others. Peer Mediation is one way that students at Lithgow high school can work together to solve their problems.

If students are not speaking, disagreeing or even fighting over an issue - then they may ask for mediation. They then sit down with mediators, who are senior students trained in peer mediation. The students in conflict talk through their problems until they reach a fair and lasting solution.

If you want help and wish to try Peer Mediation, then you may contact your:

- Student Adviser
- Roll Call teacher
- Class teacher

These people will help you to fill in a yellow referral sheet. This form should be put in one of the purple "Speak-up" boxes (one in the Library and one near the DP offices on Z2 level). Or you can fill in a yellow sheet by yourself.

The Peer Mediators will listen to both parties. Both parties will get a chance to explain the issue and how it affects them. The Peer Mediators, who are trained seniors, will help you to look at and talk about your concerns in a constructive way. You will work through the issue together and you will be encouraged to come up with ways to solve the issue without blame. In the end, both parties should be happy and agree with the solution.










Extended Senior Tuition in the Library

Message from Christopher



It almost feels like as if it was just yesterday when I started my first day of school here at LHS not really knowing what to expect but excited for what the future had for me. Now I'm almost back home with a ton of memories, photos to show, and a lot of stories to share. I will give you a little report about my past 10 months as exchange student living in Lithgow.

Well, I've wanted to be an Exchange Student my whole high school life. I read about the Australia program in a brochure from my organisation, and I thought then that living somewhere else for a while and having friends from another country would be the coolest thing in the world.

I would be on my own, have my own Indiana Jones adventure, and fulfil my dream of having

something different. Pretty soon, in summer 2015, I was applying for a High School year abroad and I decided that a whole year would give me so much more immersion and would make the experience so much better. I had an interview the following weekends about rules, how to survive, homesickness, etc. Then I got an email. I had a host family! Next thing I knew, I had a flight booked.

I was so excited and happy and I was telling all my friends about it. I actually researched heaps about Lithgow in books and in the Internet. Compared to what I saw on TV and what I experienced when I travelled to places like Los Angeles, California and within Europe, is that NSW/Lithgow has been different. It was more of countryside and the population of 13,000 is compared to my city in Germany quite small though. I didn't even know what to think about the Aussie weather and rural culture and customs.

I was pretty pleased with my host family. They treated me like their own and they are like real family in another part of the world. I had a host mom, two younger brothers and a younger sister. It was a pretty exciting experience for to live in a family just with younger siblings. I felt to be in good hands all the time and I am very grateful for everything that my host family has been made possible for me to travel around Australia and integrate into Aussie life.

I have been attending a Public High School in Lithgow and that was an adjustment coming from a Comprehensive School in Germany where no school uniform has to be worn. The school was new, everyone was different and it was so diverse. I was discombobulated during the first day of school. I didn't know anyone, I got lost since

the school was huge, and people couldn't really assess me as a person. But pretty soon I started to get comfortable.

It was always great fun to teach my classmates German words or even to explain them how things are go in Germany. They were very open-minded and soon I made a bunch of mates. I loved answering people's questions like, 'So, what is winter/ summer like in Germany?', or 'What's it like to wear `Lederhosen` every day?'. I had the chance to take serious classes like Society & Culture, English Advanced and Ancient History, which really helped me in my learning process, and so I met people with similar interests.

Certainly one of the highlights were the 'Barbie's' at school. At this point I would like to thank all of my class teachers who have always supported me and were patient with me when I was slower than everyone else, and the LHS staff who prepared me a lovely start into my exchange year.

I made a lot of friends and met so many people in these 10 months. Friends took me out to movies, hockey games and even little road trips. They were always there for me in terms of helping me with all the adjustments I had to make, like subjects and its assessment tasks, getting rides, hanging out, shopping, being in my scheduled classes, learning slang terms, everything. I will forever remember all the fun times I had with them and hope that I will come down to Australia one day again.

Being away for 10 months and living alone in a completely different world has taught me a lot of things. I have grown and my perspective has changed in ways I never would have imagined. Now I can say that I am independent, appreciate my family and friends here more, open to new ideas, quite fluent in English and more confident about myself. Having my own adventure has proven to me that anything is possible and that I can do anything. It was the best time of my life and I will always remember how choosing to go out and discover what the world has in store for me was life-changing and will be something I will always cherish.

Message from Ayana

Hi I'm Ayana Shiobara. I'm from Japan as an Exchange Student and have been here for almost 9 months. This exchange program is for 10 months so my farewell is getting close, which is little bit exciting (to see my family), but absolutely sad as well because my Aussie life has become quite natural and comfortable that I cannot think I came down to Australia just 9 months ago. I could come to this point not to mention because of my host family, friends and teachers. Now I would like to tell you about what I felt and learned through many Aussie experiences and my appreciation.

I think my experiences in Australia have greatly impacted and influenced me as "cultural experiences" rather than learning language because culture including people, a sense of humour, nature, weather, animals, food, attitude, school...i.e. is just so much different

from Japanese one I used to follow. What I used to believe was right may not be the right thing here.

At the beginning of about 3 months, this difference often made me nervous to communicate with people and feel unconfident, but when I came to realise that "It is just a difference and doesn't matter it's good or bad", I stopped protecting myself from being shocked, and shifted to enjoy that difference. Then the first thing I did was to try to talk to people many as much as possible without caring too much about my English skill. That was quite hard because I'm not really an outgoing person, but I think it led me to know more people, and extend my circle of friends. Especially joining in Japanese Class in Year 7 and was quite fun. Secondly, I tried not to hesitate too much to ask people to help.

In terms of attitude, I guess the biggest different between Australia and Japan is 'hesitation'. Culturally, we often try not to ask much not because we don't trust other people, just because it's regarded as good thing for instance, classes are very quiet in contrast to Australian classes. However, I couldn't have survived without help and support. So I started to ask for help, and host family, friends and teacher always gave me more than enough help without being bothered, which is the point I've felt in love with Aussie and helped me get close to them. Thank you so much for everything you've done for me.

Meanwhile, I absolutely got into Aussie lifestyle, and since some time or another, I had become to be able to understand the 'cultural difference" easily and enjoy every moment. Now I can realize that people could unconsciously rely on our culture more than we think, that's why we could sometimes be shocked or a little bit frustrated when we face the different culture at first, but in the long run, we are just same species. I could eventually find so much delight through many experiences in Australia, regardless of cultural difference, being flexible to keep my own identity and respecting both



cultures. Belonging to people in the different culture gave me so much joy and new perspective of life.

I'm sure people around me made stay my absolutely wonderful and meaningful. Thank you very much for being friends and helping me. Even an ordinary conversation is great memory for me. Now I'm going to make the most of the rest of my days.

The following information should be considered by parents BEFORE arranging any travel involving their children during school term time. Family holidays and travel are no longer considered under the guidelines. Travel outside of the vacation period is now counted as an absence for statistical purposes.

- Principals may not accept a reason for travel during school term if it is not in the best interests of the student. Educational, social and participation reasons, should be specified on the application.
- Travel is considered to be domestic or international travel for the purpose of a family holiday, family business, bereavement or other reasons, which should be specified on the application.
- If unsure, parents should consult with the School Principal about the intention of the travel and in the case of family holidays should make arrangements to travel during school vacation periods not during term time.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE 2016-2017 BUSH FIRE SEASON

Dear parent or carer

I am writing to let you know about arrangements for our school for the current bush fire season.

Our school has been identified as a school at increased risk if a bush fire were to break out on a day when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating is issued for our area.

To ensure the health, safety and welfare of students and staff, the NSW Department of Education and Communities has determined that on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating is issued for our area, the school will temporarily cease operations for the day(s) the rating is current and alternative learning arrangements will be put in place. This is based on information obtained through a bush fire assessment of our school arranged by the Department.

A Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating is likely to occur on a very small number of days during the bush fire season, if at all. To ensure that we continue to support student learning on these days, I have put the following arrangements in place:

The school will liaise with Emergency Service Agencies during the time of the year when the risk of bush fire is highest. Please listen to the local radio station for bush fire or weather warnings or check the LHS Facebook site (https://www.facebook.com/lithgowh) for advice and notification of any possible school closure.

A copy of information for parents provided by the Department about these arrangements is attached. Ensuring the school has up to date contact details and email addresses would also be of assistance to the school.

Information for parents and carers provided by the Department about these arrangements is attached. Up to date bush fire information will also be available to you on the Department's bush fire safety website. The link for this site is as follows:

Information for parents and carers Updated September 2016

Arrangements for the bush fire season

This brochure provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bush fire season. This information is only relevant for schools that are on the bush fire register.

Introduction

The NSW Department of Education has conducted bush fire assessments for NSW government schools in bush fire prone areas. These results have been validated by an independent external expert and have been reviewed in consultation with the NSW Rural Fire Service.

A small number of schools have been identified as a school at increased risk if a fire were to break out on a day when a catastrophic fire danger rating is issued for the area that the school is located in. This includes the school your child attends.

To ensure the health, safety and welfare of students and staff, the NSW Department of Education has determined that on days when a catastrophic fire danger rating is issued for the area the school is in, the school will temporarily cease operations for the day(s) the rating is current and alternative learning arrangements will be put in place.

What is a Fire Danger Rating?

A fire danger rating is the expected fire danger on a particular day and is determined by considering a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought. The ratings range from Low – Moderate through High, Very High, Severe, Extreme and Catastrophic.

What is a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating?

A catastrophic rating means that if fires broke out they would be uncontrollable, unpredictable and very fast moving with very aggressive flames extending high above tree tops and buildings.

When will I know if my child's school won't be operating the next day?

The State Emergency Operations
Centre (SEOC) notifies the
Department at approximately 4:30
pm each day when there are
catastrophic fire danger ratings
predicted for the following day. This
means that the school will only
receive notification of a catastrophic
fire danger rating after school hours
the day before the forecast is issued.

Your school will notify you as soon as possible. You will be notified by telephone or other communication, depending on when the school is advised that the catastrophic fire danger rating has been issued. The school will not receive this information until after school has finished on the day before the rating takes effect. The school will contact all parents and carers and, where appropriate, issue advice through local media.

Please provide your current home or after hours contact to your school. Parents and carers should also watch or listen for local media as information may be provided through these outlets.

What educational arrangements will be in place if the school isn't operating?

Talk to your school about the arrangements that will be put in place in the event of the school temporarily ceasing operations due to a catastrophic fire danger rating being issued. Schools will be undertaking advanced planning to ensure that, if schools do need to cease operations on some days, they will have

alternative educational arrangements in place such as re-locating to another school, where practicable, or providing take home work for students.

Will my child's school be affected by severe or extreme fire danger ratings?

During the bush fire season, including days of severe or extreme fire danger rating, schools will continue to operate as normal unless advised otherwise by emergency services. During the bush fire season schools will be vigilant and monitor local conditions, particularly on days when severe or extreme fire danger ratings are issued.

Plan and prepare

The Rural Fire Service has resources for all residents to plan and prepare for the bush fire season. It is important that you consider the safety of your own home from bushfire. Please find more information and resources at: http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare. See also the My Fire Plan website for resource.

We appreciate your cooperation during the bush fire season. For further information about fire danger ratings and the bush fire season, please refer to the NSW Rural Fire Service website at www.fs.nsw.gov.au.

The Department's <u>School Safety</u> website has also been established to provide up to date information during bush fires and other situations such as floods or storms.


