The information provided is very important in supporting students.

As this forms part of their HSC marks for 2019, it is vitally important that students maximise their opportunities. If a student is unable to attend an assessment they are required to complete an illness misadventure application for consideration, and they will need to provide a medical certificate or other specialist information to indicate the nature of the illness that prevented them from attending. If no such documentation is provided, students will receive an 'N' Warning notification for that assessment and a zero result. All students have access to the senior tutors in the library during study periods and the library is open for senior students every Monday to Thursday afternoon until 5.00pm. This very valued and important program is aimed at supporting all senior students to strive to do their very best during their HSC year.

LITHGOW HIGH SCHOOL VISUAL ARTS CONTINUES ARTEXPRESS SUCCESS


26 students studied HSC Visual Arts at Lithgow High School this year. Four of these have had their practical Bodies of Work preselected for Artexpress. They are **Sam Forrest, Kate Francis, Sophie Inzitari** and **Brooklyn Mackie.**

Sam's sculpture of a distorted grandfather clock entitled "The Corruption of Memory" was a recontextualisation of Salvadore Dali's famous painting "The Persistence of Memory". Kate Francis produced a sculpture of a robotic busker, and Sophie Inzitari created a kinetic sculptural mosaic tribute to famed American sculptor Alexander Calder. Brooklyn Mackie submitted a large scale drawn portrait of a coal miner created entirely from soot.

The four students had to secure marks in excess of 46/50 to qualify for preselection to Artexpress. They will be notified in the next two weeks if their work has gained a place in the exhibition, which showcases about 150 works from a field of 10,000 candidates. With the exception of 2004, Lithgow High School has had works selected for Artexpress every year since 1997 (56 works).

SRC LEADERS DAY



Cate spoke about how she has achieved and reached the point where she is today. It was not always easy and she had to sacrifice many things she liked and work very hard. Cate missed a lot of normal activities that we as young adults take for

granted, eg: parties, school gatherings, and even school to swim competitively. Cate said that to give up these thing you have to do it willingly so there are no regrets and you have to give 100% to do what you have chosen, so pick something that you are

good at and something you love, like Cate loves to sing but she's not very good at it so she wouldn't achieve. With swimming she is really good at it and loves it. You need have a positive mind set when you feel you're going to fail it is important to always remember to ask yourself "am I being kind and honest to myself?" Everyone fails at some stage but by remembering these things it won't be as tough.

Cate was a very inspiring and motivating speaker, she showed two of her medals and was happy to share her experience with us. In closing Cate left us with a very important message, that "life goes on, and to never give up".

Jordan Nguyen specializes in robotics and engineering. He spoke to us about one of the things he didn't give up on - making a motorised vehicle that can be controlled by the movements of the eye for a teen with cerebral palsy. He said it was very challenging and they had no hope, but after many day and many attempts his project was successful. He asked us what was our dream and goal, and to kept on trying to reach it.

From the Wellbeing Centre

The Wellbeing Centre at Lithgow High School has had a fantastic first year of operation with a large variety of Services and Agencies coming into the school to provide professional, specialist services for our students from Year 7 to Year 12. A huge number of students have accessed and benefited from using and engaging with these services, and report that this has really helped them, and been a really positive experience.

Students are able to access a variety of counselling support services, participate in fitness and wellbeing programs, be involved in art therapy, a brunch program, receive support for risk of homelessness, drug and alcohol information and support, and participate in educational and vocational programs which increase wellbeing, school engagement and learning goals.

Lithgow High School also has two very experienced School Counsellors - Suzanne Collum and Rosemary Black - who also provide ongoing support for our students.

We have 3 Wellbeing Rooms which are used by the outside Agencies while they are in the school. Students do not need to leave the school grounds to access this support. Service appointments are confidential and privacy is maintained.

From next week **Headspace will be available at Lithgow High School each Monday**, **Tuesday** and **Friday** while their building in Main Street is being renovated. They will also be here onsite at the start of Term One in 2019.

Our students will be able to access this early intervention mental health support service on site. Students will be receiving lots of information in the coming weeks on how to access Headspace over the Christmas holidays as well.

Students who have used services this year report a high level of satisfaction and many now refer friends and peers. Students may self-refer, and parents/carers may also request help for their children.

- a) Go to Students online http://studentsonline.bos.nsw.edu.au
- b) Go to *activate your account now* (under the **Login** banner on right hand side of page.)
- c) Fill in details:

d) Submit

Your student number will appear on the screen. Write it down At the same time an email will be sent to your school email address.

- e) Go to your school email account and open the email sent to you by the Board of Studies
- f) Click on the website listed in the letter. This will take you to the site where you create your PIN. (You will need your student number for this site.)
- g) Enter your student number and submit, and then enter your chosen PIN (it has to be a six -digit number.) **Write it down.**
- h) Once that's done, you should be taken automatically back to the **studentsonline** home page, and you should already be logged in.
- i) If you're not, go back in to http://studentsonline.bos.nsw.edu.au home page and log in with your student number and your PIN.
- j) Go to *My Details* and then go to *Enrolments/Results* and select Stage 5 from the *Currently Viewing* drop-down menu.
- k) Click Request eRecord.
- Go to My Messages to access your School Certificate eRecord (it might take a few minutes for it to be sent to My Messages)
- m) Once it's there, you can open it by clicking on the paper clip icon.

Fantastic Beasts and the Crimes of Grindelwald (2018) Film Review

Fantastic Beasts and the Crimes of Grindelwald is the newest movie as part of the Fantastic Beasts Harry Potter series. The film continues on from where Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them leaves off with the introduction of a few new storylines and characters. Keeping in the same 20's era, the visuals of the movie are stunning with fantastic outfits, costumes and special effects that make the magical universe seem real.

The main character Newt Scamander, played by Eddie Redmayne, is an English wizard traveling around the wizarding world to collect knowledge on magical creatures and beasts for his upcoming book on how to treat them. The emotive cinematography of the films allows for the audience to connect more with Newt in this film and his character becomes more complex and more developed. Some familiar characters are brought back including Tina Goldstein, played by Katherine Waterston, Queenie Goldstein, played by Alison Sudol, and Jacob Kowalski, played by Dan Fogler. With these characters came the addition of many new ones. This made the movie feel overcrowded and it was hard to keep track of who was doing what. Because there were so many new and unfamiliar characters there was not time for in depth character analysis and exploration of backstories and relations between people. This made the audience feel lost and like things had not been finished.

On This Day in History - 30th November, 1874

Winston Churchill Born



Winston Leonard Spencer Churchill, the British leader who guided Great Britain and the Allies through the crisis of World War II, is born at Blenheim Palace in Oxfordshire, England.

Churchill had an illustrious military career, serving in India, the Sudan,

and South Africa, and distinguishing himself several times in battle. In 1899, he resigned his commission to concentrate on his literary and political career and in 1900 was elected to Parliament as a Conservative MP from Oldham.

In 1904, he joined the Liberals, serving in a number of important posts before being appointed Britain's First Lord of the Admiralty in 1911, where he worked to bring the British navy to a readiness for the war he foresaw.

In 1915, in the second year of World War I, Churchill was held responsible for the disastrous Dardanelles and Gallipoli campaigns.

After the outbreak of World War II in Europe, Churchill was called back to his post as First Lord of the Admiralty and eight months later replaced the ineffectual Neville Chamberlain as prime minister of a new coalition government. In the first year of his administration, Britain stood alone against Nazi Germany, but Churchill promised his country and the world that the British people would "never surrender." He rallied the British people to a resolute resistance and expertly orchestrated Franklin D. Roosevelt and Joseph Stalin into an alliance that eventually crushed the Axis.

In July 1945, 10 weeks after Germany's defeat, his Conservative government suffered an electoral loss and Churchill resigned as prime minister. He became leader of the opposition and in 1951 was again elected prime minister.

Churchill was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II and awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature for his six-volume historical study of World War II and for his political speeches. In 1955, he retired as prime minister but remained in Parliament until 1964, the year before his death.


